t's 2023! What another big season that lies ahead for CFDA! We already have over 25 CFDA Titled Championships scheduled as of this writing, plus there are possibly a few more in the making.

New Book

There's a book that has been on my mind to write for a number of years. The story to tell is based on my 55 years of being heavily involved in multiple shooting sports. Even though I've been involved in some long-gun sports, my main interest has always been action pistol speed shooting sports. It'll be mainly focused on my account of the history and people of these sports. There'll also be some documented accounts of perceptions that these sports and the people involved in them, not only by media, but from across other shooting sports as well. I've submitted an excerpt from part of this book to Hannah Calder for publishing in this issue of our Gunslinger's Gazette to give our members an advanced preview of a book even though it has yet to be titled. I hope you enjoy it.

New Rulebook

By now you have all received and read your new 12th Edition Gunslinger's Guidelines, right? We had hoped our stock of CFDA Gunslinger Guidelines, Rules, Regulations, and Hand Books would last another year. But, we've been signing up so many new members, plus clubs and members ordering extra copies, that we had to publish the 12th Edition, which you have probably received by now. With our new format we actually had a few more pages available. Back by popular demand, our "Youth Safety & Training Program", plus a new article, "Explaining NRA/CFDA Insurance Program", and an updated article of "How to Travel on Airlines to CFDA Events". You can access this information on Pages 31 - 34. We're hoping that this 12th Edition will last for 3 years, so Page 35 is for our member's use to post Notes & Addendums, when and if they occur, so we can all keep our rulebooks current.

In the 12^{th} Edition there are just a few changes, most of them are highlighted using greencolored text, so that our members can find them easier. Since our season is upon us, let's cover the main ones:

1. Page 7. General Exemption #3 – Special Medical Conditions – Quite frankly, as some members age, except me since I never age (2), we find that more and more of us are having trouble finding comfortable western-style footwear. Especially, if we have certain medical symptoms associated with diabetes, neuropathy, or other ailments. We had a lengthy discussion about General Exemption #3 at our 2022 Marshal's Muster and here are the notations that were approved by consensus by a large majority of our U.S. Marshals.

A. Remember there's a difference between a

temporary Match Director Exemption and a CFDA Approved Permanent Exemption for a chronic (long-term/permanent) medical condition.

The member <u>does need to make an effort</u> to make the shoes look appropriate for a CFDA Approved Permanent Exemption.

- Check out moccasins with arch support or Brogan's Shoes (all leather, making shoes since the 1800s), and other options. (For the convenience of our members, we've added those examples and a few more in our rulebook.)
- Leave the enforcement to Match Directors – Please don't gossip about what someone is wearing since you won't know what their circumstances are. We should all respect the medical privacy of our fellow members. Only Match Directors should have direct conversations with CFDA members concerning either granting them a Temporary Exemption or requiring the member to produce a CFDA Permanent Exemption letter.

In other words, if you are concerned that someone's footwear may not be within our rules, it's appropriate to bring it to the attention of the Match Director, but please leave it right there.

Note: This issue has long been too much of a gray area. Only while writing this column have I realized our rulebook does not exactly state as the U.S. Marshals agreed, that Match Directors will be in charge of enforcing this rule. Therefore, I will post a re-written General Exemption #3, in the form of a CFDA Official Addendum, by the time this Gunslinger Gazette has reached our members.

2. Page 23. #10 – Range is Hot, Clear to Handle Your Six-Guns – Added in Green, "Please do not use this command after targets are greased or before "Load and Make Ready Command". The reason is that too many Range Masters are using this command at inappropriate times.

3. Page 24. Rule 17 Enforcement Policy, has been re-written.

There was also a very important sentence that has been added that all Match Officials, should take note of, <u>not just for Rule 17, But for all CFDA</u> <u>Rules:</u> "Just like any other rule enforcement, when acting as an official, if we see an infraction, we are obligated to call it. We must play our part to provide fair competition on behalf of <u>ALL</u> of our fellow competitors. If we do not <u>clearly</u> see an infraction, it is a NO CALL!

4. Page 26. Standard Safety Violations - #4. <u>Accidental</u> Discharge of the Gun in the Holster, Shooting the Holster, a Bullet Impacting Behind the Firing Line, or Outside of a Shooter's Lane. There are two changes to this rule both as a result of Muster Marshal's Agenda Item #8. Marshal's Musters are very important to CFDA, since a round table discussion includes many opinions from the leaders across our sport. Sometimes the results are surprising, even to me.

This discussion actually started about what happens when a shooter fires a shot and hits

the wrong target on purpose or by accident. It was originally based upon alleged unsportsmanlike conduct, however during the discussion it began to take on another dimension. Here are the three conditions that were agreed upon.

- A. A titled match is not the time or place for this type of play.
- B. If the RM determines that was done on purpose and in an unsportsmanlike manner then the RM should call an Unsportsmanlike Conduct Violation, especially in CFDA Titled Championships.

C. If it is determined it was done by accident, the RM must consider the situation case-bycase and determine an appropriate call, i.e. ricochet, poor gun handling, etc.

As a result, the word "Accidental" was inserted in the front of the rule, plus "or Outside of a Shooter's Lane" was added to the end of the rule.

We all know that none of us fire a shot in our holster, shoot our holster, or behind the firing line intentionally, therefore these are all examples accidental discharges. However, if a shooter is <u>accidentally</u> firing a shot outside or over their shooting lane, these are examples of uncontrolled and unsafe gun handling. Firing a shot within a lane and in front of the firing line according to our rules is nothing more than a premature trigger engagement or just a miss. It's not "losing control of your firearm", which is an entirely different situation and the very definition of unsafe gun handling in any shooting sport.

Therefore, if officials determine that unsafe gun handling has occurred, especially when involving an accidental discharge, a penalty should be applied.

5. Page 26. Standard Safety Violations - #5. A Match Director has the authority to declare that any shot fired over a Backstop will result in a major Safety Violation (MSV).

Penalty: Match DQ

Our rule for years has been, at a minimum, when a shot goes over a backstop it is a Loss of Round. That is unless the Match Director has declared that a natural or manmade backstop exists. **SEE Page 28. Backstops, Side Walls, and Shooting Lane Requirements - #3.** "Some areas with natural or manmade barriers replace the need to build backstops as described below." Some Match Directors will provide backstops as a convenience for shooters to spot their misses. This is the <u>only</u> <u>time</u> a Match Director should ever declare that a shot over a backstop is not a Loss of Round Penalty.

In Closing

Well, before Boothill Bryce starts playing that Darth Vader theme song again, like he did in Deadwood ②, I had better hit the trail. Speaking of hitting the trail, I hope to see you all at CFDA contests across the nation this year. As Roy Roger's theme song says, "Happy Trails to You".

TFDA Staff has selected the Association of Arizona Gunslingers our Club of the Year for 2022. We have so many great clubs in CFDA, it's one of the most challenging decisions we make each year. We chose this club because of their significant history and contributions to our sport. They are also one of our largest and strongest recruiting clubs. In 2022, they ran a very successful Arizona State Championship & tied for 1st Place in our Golden Spike Awards. They have also continuously conducted large Try Cowboy Fast Draw Events for over 12 years at the Ben Avery Range in conjunction with the SASS National Championship a.k.a. Winter Range and now End of Trail - World SASS Championship, which has introduced Cowboy Fast Draw to thousands of spectators.

The Association of Arizona Gunslingers was originally founded in 2008 by Noah Chance, with the help of Thirsty and several others as they began to build their club. The Club's members helped build what Noah Chance called a "Club in a Box", which they moved around Arizona and Southern California to help new clubs learn how to run contests, which contributed to the formation several CFDA clubs.

I called their leader Shady Mike to share the news of this great accomplish. He was quite surprised and extremely proud of his club! I asked him if he had some time for a short interview, and he agreed, since many of our CFDA Affiliated Clubs and their members are always interested in learning how to build a successful club.

QC: What Kind of Facilities Do You Shoot In?

SM: We are fortunate to have the Pioneer History Museum to hold our Monthly Matches. There are crowds coming through on weekends when we have our events that learn about Cowboy Fast Draw. We also practice at my home on Shady Mountain on every Wednesday and some Sundays. One of our newest Board Members, Yucca Kid, also has set up a range at his place that we are starting to use more and more.

QC: What Kind and How Many Events Do You Hold a Month?

QC: Howdy Dead Eye Daisy, It's a CFDA Tradition to interview our Top Guns of the Year and publish the article in our Winter Issue of the Gunslinger's Gazette. 2022 was a great year for you! You really got your season going by competing in May at the MI State & Great Lakes Territorial Championship that was hosted by your home club, the Great Lakes Gunslingers, your family started. In spite, of all the work you and your family put in that match you placed 3^{rd} in MI State and 2^{nd} in the Territorial. Then your next event was the Nationals in Deadwood, where it wasn't your best performance. But then, with 2/3rds of the CFDA Season over in August you went on a run, starting in Mitchell, SD with a 2nd Place in the SD State, and then finally your first win of the year, the High Plain Territorial! There was a tight race in Top Gun Points with at

least four other ladies, your daughter Flying Cowgirl, Lefty Lipscomb, Debbie Sioux, and Slowpoke in close contention. Then, you won GA State, 2^{nd} in KY State, won Great Plains Territorial, and it all came down to the FGA. So how do you feel about winning CFDA's Ladies Top Gun of the Year?

DED: I am super honored! And, frankly a bit lucky.... The competition was fierce, right up to the end. You're right there were 5 of us, and winning the 70 points at FGA could have won Top Gun of the Year for any of us.

QC: How did you get started in Cowboy Fast Draw?

DED: My husband, John a.k.a. J.C. Dalton was recovering from a stroke. He's been an avid competitor in shooting sports and hunting for years, and has always loved the history of the Old West. One day he was watching the show about the FGA on Shooting USA's program on the Outdoor Channel and got very interested in Cowboy Fast Draw. Quick Cal, that was the very day he called you at CFDA Headquarters and after speaking with you he ordered everything we needed to get started. John saw it as a great way to share a fun sport together as a family. Then, after we got all the equipment, hooked it up and started practicing all three of us enjoyed it, and soon realized how much we loved doing it together. It wasn't long that we gained enough confidence to try traveling to some contests and it blossomed from there.

QC: What do you love most about Cowboy Fast Draw?

DED: The people and family aspect that it has. Everyone was so open and helpful in getting our family started. From the helpful advice you and Alotta Lead gave us from CFDA Headquarters, to the very first club contest that we drove 8 hours to shoot with the Black River Bandits. Fossilman, Lightnin and their entire club were so friendly and supportive. Everywhere we go we meet so many wonderful people!

QC: What inspired you to train to become a Champion?

DED: I loved competitive sports as a kid and played on our High School Basketball & Volleyball Teams. I also played some sports in college. As a family we competed in Archery and Trap Tournaments together. I have always loved to train at any sport to do the best that I can do. But, there is something unique about Cowboy Fast Draw, it has become a lifestyle of camaraderie. In all the other sports you tend to blend into a team or squad atmosphere, but in CFDA it's a "one on one" challenge for each and every round, and every round is different.

QC: How much and how do you practice?

DED: Not really much in the off-season, but we will start getting ready soon. I'm really lucky that I have J.C. Dalton and Flying Cowgirl to practice with. Many times all three of us practice together, we really have a lot of fun doing that! As the season approaches I practice at least 3 times a week. During the season as contests approach 5 times a week or more. Also, a lot with lasers, they're very convenient and helpful.

QC: Do you have any tips for our members? DED: Have Fun! If you want to do your best, then you have to practice. I've learned to take the emotion and frustration out of practice. Just focus on building confidence in hitting the target with your best draw.

QC: What accomplishment are you most proud of?

DED: The FGA in Fallon was amazing for me. I'm honored to be the first Lady to win the Marshal's Cup, then went on to win Lady's 49'r, Ladies Tournament of Champions, shot a clean main match (No X's) to earn the Top Seed in the Magnificent 7, Won the FGA, and Ladies Top Gun of the Year, all in one weekend!

QC: What are your goals for 2023?

DED: Continue to keep my pace with accuracy as fast as I can, to keep my game at a competitive level. If I just do that, I'll have fun and winning will take care of itself.

2022 MEN'S TOP GUN OF THE YEAR JOE B. WALES (LA)

QC: Howdy Joe B. Wales, It's a CFDA Tradition to interview our Top Guns of the Year and publish the article in our Winter Issue of the Gunslinger's Gazette. You had a heck of a year in 2022! You started out by winning the Texas State Championship on about the 1-year anniversary of joining CFDA! If that wasn't amazing enough, you went on to win or place very high in almost every match you entered. You won TX State, LA State, Southern Territorial, High Plains Territorial, and capped off the year winning FGA! So how do you feel about winning Men's Top Gun of the Year?

JBW: It was a very emotional year! You're right, winning the Texas State after only shooting Cowboy Fast Draw for a year lifted my confidence to an almost unbelievable level where I began to realize that I had a chance to win against some of the best shooters in the world. All I could do is pray to God that I would do my best to control the adrenaline rush I was getting.

QC: How did you get started in Cowboy Fast Draw?

JBW: My wife Casey and I were on vacation in Colorado and got invited to Try Cowboy Fast Draw and I was hooked after 10 Shots. We went home and checked the CFDA Website and found the closest club to us was the Big Thicket Bushwackers in Silsbee, TX. What a friendly bunch of people, they loaned me a gun, holster and whatever else I needed and got me started right away. A month later I shot the Louisiana State!

QC: What do you love most about Cowboy Fast Draw?

JBW: Everyone I've met in CFDA are beautiful people! The friendships that Casey and I have made in what we all refer to as the CFDA Family is almost unbelievable, we are truly blessed.

QC: What inspired you to train to become

a Champion?

JBW: It's in my DNA. What I mean is that I have always loved to compete at a high level. I ran my first marathon when I was only 9 years old. I competed in Track & Field events as a teenager and Rodeo Bull Riding in my 20's. Whatever I do, I train to do it the best that I can. I really love the feeling of the adrenaline rush I get from competition! I had not had that feeling for almost 40 years, I thought I would never experience that feeling again. Cowboy Fast Draw has brought my competitive spirit back into my life!

QC: How much and how do you practice?

JBW: Especially when getting ready for the season, I try to practice at least 4 days a week. For me, the best time to practice is as soon as I get home from work, when I go directly out to my range. I structure and focus my practice on learning to hit my best shot at least 60%. I work on my concentration. Cowboy Fast Draw is really a skull game to shoot round after round against a wide variety of competitors. Making it through "The Gauntlet" just to make it to the Magnificent 7 Finals is what makes CFDA the most exciting game in Fast Draw!

QC: What accomplishment are you most proud of?

JBW: At first, I thought that winning the Texas State after only 1-year in the sport was my biggest accomplishment. But, after reflecting on the entire season, of course, nothing can match winning Fastest Gun Alive! Then, winning Top Gun of the Year is just the icing on the cake!

I also want to say something about what happened at FGA. I was both proud and nervous, as anyone would be, about making the Magnificent 7 at FGA. I must have dry-fired with my laser a thousand times in the hours leading up to the Shoot-off. About 5 minutes before I came to the line, I went over to dry-fire a few more snaps, and my main gun broke! A Ruger, that I had been using exclusively all summer long. I had to switch to my



back-up gun that had different grips and that I hadn't shot in months. It amplified my adrenaline to heights I've never experienced before. But somehow, someway I held it together and shot through it. As just about everyone knows, I'm a pretty emotional guy after the shooting is done, but all I could do after cleared and holstered was to bow down, kneel on the firing line, and give praise to God.

QC: What are your goals for 2023?

JBW: CFDA had turned my life around. I feel God has led me into this sport, helping my personal life to be more rounded. I will continue to work to become faster and keep accuracy. The Lord only knows, but it's gonna be Fun!!!

CONGRATULATIONS TO THE TOP 10 MEN & LADIES

Each year CFDA conducts a year-end points race to determine the CFDA Top Gun of the Year. Shooters can accumulate points by attending and doing well in all CFDA Titled Championships. Each shooter's best highest 6 point totals will be tallied at the end of the year. Competitor tally must include their 2 best finishes in State Championships and any 4 others to establish their point total for the year. CFDA Awards the Top 10 Men and Women with belt buckles at the conclusion of the World Championship. Tie-breakers are determined by overall placing at the World Championship, where the season concludes each year. Any contests held after that date will apply to the following season.

COCONUT POKE CAKE

Coconut Poke Cake- who doesn't love a good coconut anything? But if you have never tried a coconut cake, this one is the one you've been waiting for

Super easy, but taste like you worked on it for hours-give it a try-our next coconut poke cake will be served at Easter dinner!

Here's what you'll need- not much at all! 🐵

- 1- Can of COCONUT CREAM 14oz can (not coconut milk)
- 1- Can sweetened condensed milk 14 oz can
- 1- Tub frozen topping thawed (I like Cool Whip)
- 1- package flaked coconut 8oz bag

1- Box white cake mix (18.25 oz size) you're favorite brand

That's it & Super Easy! Bake cake according to directions in a 9x13 pan, while it's still hot, poke a bunch of holes with either an pencil eraser size object or a fork- I like the bigger holes to get more goodness down into the cake! Mix coconut cream and sweetened condensed milk together in a small bowl and pour all over the warm cake. Cake can be refrigerated over night-covered of course, and actually the longer it sits like a day or so the better! 

As we finished dinner and awards, The James Slack Band kicked it up a notch and Old Drifter set up the Poker Tournament. Brickly Bear & Oregon Ranger Overcome top competitors to become the Overall 2022 Western Territorial Champions

Now we start the Grand Finale with two youth shooters. We have Six Gun Shelbs on lane 3 and Showdown on lane 4, front and center. These two kiddos took 12 shots to determine the top youth shooter but they both walked off the line as Champions, Billy the Kid and Annie Oakley.

The Top 7 seeded ladies stepped toward the line to start their shoot off. Ricochet Rose and Sweet Fuse shot off first. With 4 shots down range its determined Ricochet Rose will battle with the next opponent while Sweet Fuse waits for the next gunfighter. Alotta Lead comes up to take on Ricochet Rose but six shots later. its Ricochet Rose that will stand beside Sweet Fuse once again for 7th place. Alotta Lead takes on Lefty Lipscomb, but five shots later, its Alotta Lead that will take on Lacy Gone Wild. Six shots between Ricochet Rose and Sweet Fuse and Sweet Fuse becomes 7th place in the Western Territorial Championship. Alotta Lead and Lacy Gone Wild take six shots while Lefty Lipscomb and Ricochet Rose also take six. This determines Ricochet Rose as 6th place. Now this will put Alotta Lead against Jess, our 3rd seed and Lefty Lipscomb against Lacy Gone Wild. Four shots between the two challenges, Jess wins her battle against Alotta Lead and Lefty Lipscomb wins hers giving Lacy Gone Wild 5th place in the Western Territorial Championship. Prickly Pear, our only Jr female shooter and first seed walks to the line to take on Jess. While Lefty Lipscomb and Alotta Lead shoot out to see who will take 4th place. Alotta Lead and Lefty Lipscomb finish their rounds first, leaving Lefty Lipscomb in 4th place. Prickly Pear takes the round from Jess, putting herself in the cat bird seat to wait and watch the outcome of Jess and Alotta Lead. This also becomes the shoot off for the Resident Champion. Jess from California and Alotta Lead from Nevada. This round had a lot of hits, and their times were so close, but Alotta Lead prevailed and won the Resident Champion spot while Jess took 3rd place in the Western Territorial Championship.

Prickly Pear now walks back to the line to take on the Western Territorial Resident Champion, Alotta Lead. It only took five shots for these ladies to secure the champion. Both hit three times but Prickly Pear was just faster each hit.

The Western Territorial Championship was Prickly Pears first winning Championship in the lady's division, and she did it as a Jr. This young lady carried herself as a true gunfighter this weekend. Never giving up, always there to help and always respectful to all. I hope you always remember this Championship win and the tough ladies you had to shoot against to get there. Congratulations Prickly Pear!!

Then we bring up the Men. Up to the line for the first bout is Crosswired - 6th seed and Gambler - 7th seed. Four quick shots down range and Gambler will move on. Crosswired shakes Gamblers hand and waits his turn to see who he takes on next. Gambler will now take on Dead Eye Kid. This time its three shots, 1 2 3 and Gambler sends Dead Eye Kid down to shoot off with Crosswired for 7th place. Buzzard Cooper paces up to the line to take on Gambler. Buzzard Cooper takes the round between he and Gambler and after three shots its Crosswired who prevails while Dead Eye Kid takes 7th place. This will bring out our 3rd seed Oregon Ranger, to shoot off with Buzzard Cooper and Gambler with Crosswired to shoot off for a final round to determine 6th place as both men are wounded with one X. Both gunfights finished in five rounds. Oregon Ranger wins his battle against Buzzard Cooper and Gambler defeats Crosswired placing him in 6th place. Out comes our 2nd seed - Ranger Reeves to take on Oregon Ranger, as the two wounded battle each other a final time. Oregon Ranger won his round after taking it to two to one and Gambler defeated Buzzard Cooper leaving him in 5th place. Gambler will now take on Ranger Reeves for 4th place and Oregon Ranger will battle with the 1st seed, Tin Bender. A tough 1 2 3 and a handshake from Oregon Ranger, put himself in the cat bird seat while sending Tin Bender down to tend with Gambler after he defeated Ranger Reeves and

leaves him in 4th place. Now we watch as the 7th seed – Gambler, takes on 1st seed - Tin Bender for 3rd place. The winner of this bout takes on Oregon Ranger who is watching from the catbird seat with a feather already in his mouth. Within five shots and three hits apiece, only one shot separates these gunfighters. Tin Benders .375 places Gamblers .389 in 3rd place. Still great shooting from 7th seed to 3rd place. Oregon Ranger humbly walks back up to the line, shaking hands with Tin Bender and both men wishing each other good luck. These two men have been in this scenario, many times together. Oregon Ranger is clean while Tin Bender has one X. This time its Tin Bender who gives the tough 1 2 3 back to Oregon Ranger, as he did to him in their previous round. They switch lanes and this is it. Both men are now wounded with an X. Four shots down range, both hitting three times. Tin Bender takes 2nd place and Oregon Ranger claims the final gunfight of the Western Territorial Championship.

After watching the entertaining finals, we all gathered inside to acknowledge our award recipients.

Exciting Things Happening in Georgia!

The 2nd Annual Georgia State Cowboy Fast Draw Championship is on April 14th - 16th at Cagle's Farm 362 Stringer Road, Holly Springs, Georgia!

The event is called "*Gun Fight at Cagle's Corral*." The farm was a working dairy until a few years ago when the city of Holly Springs bought it and made a city park for different venues such as a corn maze, petting zoo, and events like our Georgia Championship.

We are 5 miles from dozens of hotels, restaurants and shopping, and we will shoot under a roof covering two six lane ranges. There will be plenty of parking and real restrooms and a food truck on site. You may bring tents and chairs, but there is room under the pavilion if you only bring chairs. This will be a first class event.

Category matches will begin on Friday and will be a 3X last shooter-standing event. Saturday begins the Georgia State and will be a 4X event ending in a Magnificent 7 shootout on Sunday. The Resurrection match will also be on Sunday. The banquet will be Saturday Night with the category match awards, and awards to the best dressed, and best-dressed couple based on what is worn to the banquet. Raffle winners will also be announced.

Awards will be given to places 1st through 3rd for the Category matches.

The awards in the Georgia State will be 1st through 15th to the men, and 1st through 10th to the ladies. A certificate for two new guns will be awarded to the champions as well as belt buckles. The Magnificent seven finishers will receive money and plaques.

You can save money if you get your entry forms in by March 14th, 2023, after that the entry fees go up.

The Atlanta Airport is 35minues from the tournament, depending on traffic. Plan to come to a great event, the CFDA Georgia State Champioinship!



Explore the Beauty of the Big Thicket National Preserve During the 2023 Texas State Championship

The BIG THICKET (Bushwackers): The Biological Crossroads of North America and Bigfoot Sightings Established by Congress in October 1974 along with Big Cypress National Preserve, Big Thicket National Preserve was one of the first areas to be designated a national preserve.

Congress mandated that the preserve was to "assure the preservation, conservation, and protection of the natural, scenic, and recreational values of a significant portion of the Big Thicket area in the State of Texas."

The original Big Thicket of Texas covered between 2 million and 3 million acres in what is now mapped as the Piney Woods and Coastal Marsh ecoregions of the state. People have called the Big Thicket an "American ark" and "the biological crossroads of North America," as it has one of the most biologically diverse assemblages of species in the world. It is a transition zone where southeastern swamps, eastern deciduous forests, central plains, pine savannas, and dry sandhills meet. This diverse habitat allows an impressive array of species to coexist, including approximately 1,320 species of trees, shrubs, vines, and grasses (vascular plants), 60 mammal species, 86 reptile & amphibian species, 34 species of freshwater mussels, nearly 1,800 invertebrate species just in the Lepidoptera Family (butterflies, moths, skippers), 97 fish species, at least 300 bird species, and 660 species of mushrooms. Cactus and orchids, beech trees and bald cypress trees, azaleas and pine trees, roadrunners and alligators, and historically, bison, jaguars & red wolves, are all included in the array of species. Four of the five known types of carnivorous plants found in the U.S. are found in the Big Thicket. The abundant rainfall and the long growing season, around 246 days, ensures that the vegetation and animal life thrive in this unique area of Texas.

It was also a perfect place to hide. Although criminals and scofflaws used the Thicket to escape local law enforcement throughout the region's early history of Anglo settlement, the Thicket's most renowned fugitives were Confederate deserters during the Civil War. Soldiers wanting to avoid the battle took to the woods, living off the land, often trading goods with locals while evading "authority" (never a popular entity in the Thicket). In order to flush out suspected deserters, the local Confederate Army would set fires to the Thicket in an attempt to drive them from their hiding places and out in the open, not an easy task considering the Thicket's density and size.

Fugitives weren't the only specters haunting the environs, however. Tales of swamp ghosts and spirits populate Big Thicket lore, including the mystery light of Bragg Road. The ghost light is said to appear along a dirt road running through the Thicket, swaying to and fro in the hands of a spirit railroad worker killed on the tracks. Advancing and receding according to whim, the light seems to approach almost close enough to decipher only to retreat or rise up and disappear in the night sky. But perhaps the biggest ghost is the Thicket itself. Small, remnant pockets now comprise the once contiguous environment, survivors of an ecosystem in sharp decline. The Big Thicket National Preserve is represented by twelve units distributed across the Forest Trail Region, a dismembered ghost of a former giant. By day, the Big Thicket looks like pretty much any other large, sprawling mass of forestland.

It's after the sun has set, however, and darkness has fallen on the Big Thicket that things begin to change – and to a significant and creepy degree. Much of the high-strangeness of the Bigfoot variety is focused in the vicinity of a six mile-long stretch of fairly primitive road that runs through the woods and which is called Bragg Road. While that's the road's official title, it also has an unofficial name, too: Ghost Light Road. It takes its curious name from the fact that, for centuries, people have reported seeing, strange, eerie floating balls of light flitting around the woods – balls of light that vary from the size of approximately a tennis ball to a soccer ball. And, it's against this weird background that the Big Thicket Bigfoot dwells. Rumors began flying around Hardin County that a wild man, wearing no clothes, but covered with hair, had been seen in the northern part of the county in the dense bottom land forests along Village Creek. Data uncovered on encounters with huge, ape-like animals from the 1960s to the present day, as well as highly controversial- but deeply intriguing accounts suggesting a connection between the wild men and the Big Thicket's resident ghostly lights, and even stories of isolated pockets of Native Americans living deep in the most dense parts of the woods. When a notice was run in the paper calling for stories of unusual sightings in the woods, they were deluged with letters. A teenage girl claimed that a giant ape had chased her away from a cemetery. A couple in a car on Ghost Road - the local lovers' lane reported that Bigfoot jumped on their hood, forcing the man, who fortunately had his shotgun handy, to scare the creature away by firing at it through the front windshield. For sure, the Big Thicket is one of the strangest places on the planet. Sinister too! Come on down to the Big Thicket for the 2023 TEXAS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP, March 31, April Fool's Day, and April 2, if you dare.



The History of Speed Shooting & How it Eventually Relates to CFDA

The following is an article that is really an excerpt from a book that I've been contemplating writing for a number of years, and have now started.

Why I write this book- I have a very unique view of action pistol speed shooting sports that perhaps no one else on this earth has ever had. I've had the honor to rise to top level as a competitor in four major timed action pistol sports. Fast Draw (WFDA), IPSC/ USPSA, Cowboy Action Shooting (SASS), and Cowboy Fast Draw (CFDA). My life has been enrichened in so many ways by my love of shooting sports, for which I feel I owe a huge debt.

When I was younger, I really didn't understand what kept driving me to dedicate such huge parts of my life to not only compete at a high level, but also to give back to those sports. I've formed or founded clubs, built some very large indoor and outdoor shooting ranges, held elected or appointed offices in not only a number of clubs, but also some of the national organizations.

There was also a time in my life that I had contracts to create firearm training programs, one for Bally's Casino (Reno) for their security force of 180 armed officers. Plus, law enforcement firearm training program for the Pershing County (NV) Sheriff's Department, for which they deputized me.

This book is NOT about me, although you can read my biographies, both shooting and administrative, if you want to know more posted on the CFDA Website. But, rather my unique experiences over 55 years of "speed shooting" sports, not only as a competitor, but also as an administrator and match director

> of major competitions. I have had the distinct pleasure and honor to meet and speak with some of the most notable figures in the history of shooting sports, firearms and entertainment industry.

> You may also learn from my biographies that I have transitioned from, to, from, and back to Fast Draw several times. Why? Because even though Fast Draw has always been my "First-Love" of shooting sports, at times things just got "politically stupid" and the negativity drove me elsewhere, instead of watching them continue to destroy themselves. The founding of CFDA restored my hope and I apply the lessons learned from all of experiences into my currently managing the

Cowboy Fast Draw Association.

Lately, I've become very interested in defining exactly why CFDA has become the largest Fast Draw organization to ever exist, so that others who may follow someday will understand what drives it and how to build Cowboy Fast Draw for future generations to enjoy. It really comes down to history! How else can we ever learn from our successes or failures without knowing our history?

I am dedicating these writings most of all to my family. Dinah, who has been my best friend, partner, and put up with my obsession with shooting sports throughout our 45 years together. To my son CJ, who has been at my side in both business and enjoyment in the shooting sports that we've shared together. To Erika, who has always been there with support in more ways than she can know, and for the countless hours of dedication as Editorin-Chief of the Gunslinger's Gazette and managing our social media assets. Also, I can never forget the many thousands of wonderful people that I have met and made friends with across the shooting disciplines, the bond between fellow "gunfighters" is unbreakable.


Part I - How I Got Involved

Like many youngsters that grew up in my generation (50's & 60's), and the generation before, we idolized the western heroes and characters that were based on the Romance & Legend of the Old West that was created by Hollywood. These were the "super-heroes" of our time, as they were as far back as the late 1800's as portrayed in countless "dime-novels". These dime-novels became the basis for script formulas for the many Hollywood movies that followed.

In 1967 my father, Elmer, discovered the sport of Fast Draw while vacationing in Tombstone, AZ where he encountered the Annual Helldorado Days Fast Draw Championship, that were held during that era. He began talking to Dick Plum who won the event and said, "They don't have this kind of thing where I'm from, I live near Chicago." To that, Dick answered, "Sure they do, that's where I'm from", he then invited him to come and visit the Chicago Colts Fast Draw Club. My Dad joined, and being a talented machinist, after seeing the highly customized guns they were using, he decided to build his own. Since I was a product of the above paragraph, like my father before me, I took an interest in what he was doing, Dad noticed and brought me to a club shoot. At age 15, in 1968, I became not only hooked but obsessed with the sport of Fast Draw, it has never worn off

Part II - History (Old West Time Period)



After the Civil War ended in 1865, our nation was still deeply divided. Some soldiers went home, and some became drifters with many probably suffering from what we now know as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD). Go West Young Man, Go West!" was the mantra of the middle 1800's period. Whether it be for mining, sod-busting, or cattle ranching, many towns and cities were created as railroads were crisscrossing across the nation and beginning to tie it all together. Attracted to all of this excitement were a mixture of ex-soldiers, settlers, entrepreneurs, cattle ranchers, railroaders, preachers, entertainers, gamblers, prostitutes, and others. Lawlessness also began to rage as the strong simply realized that they could just take what they wanted from the weak, that is, until the lawmen and U.S. Army outposts started to arrive. For the next 30 years or so became the period known as the American Old West or Wild West.

Holsters- Most holsters were made by saddle makers and evolved very slowly with many coming from Mexico. The California Pattern a.k.a. Slim Jim were the most common until Mexican Loop Holsters became more and more popular, these and their variations were pretty much what was available in the Old West. In that era, holsters were designed to protect pistols from the actual sometimes harsh elements such as dust, mud, and rain. Whereas, CFDA holsters are primarily based upon these



same design patterns, but have alterations for lower front and side cuts that must still meet minimum competition standards.

Six-Guns- The six-guns were mainly the cap & ball percussion type. Although Rolin White patented the first cartridge that Smith & Wesson purchased to produce their Model 1, it was only a .22 and was under-powered and not very reliable in the rugged conditions of a battlefield.

Samuel Colt, inventor of the revolving pistol and assembly line, created a state-ofthe-art factory that produced most of the guns used in the Civil War, among them the 1851 Navy (later the choice of Wild Bill Hickok), and the 1860 Army (Civil War). He made them affordable so the average person could own them. It was said, "God made men,

Sam Colt made them equal." Samuel Colt died in 1862 and in 1864 the Colt Factory was destroyed in a fire. Three years later after the factory was re-built, longtime Colt Engineer, Richards, Charles was charged with getting the company back into production. Richards realized that Colt Co. had storage buildings, that didn't burn down in the fire, filled with percussion pistol parts. With the S&W cartridge patent running out in 1869, he saw the timing opportunity to design what became known the Richard's as Conversion and began to produce conversion models out of most of Colt also the parts. marketed Richard sale and also took in thousands of customer's guns to perform these conversions upon. These became the most popular, affordable, and common six-guns of the 1870's.

In 1871, the U.S. Army wanted a new and stronger cartridge-based single action revolver. Both Smith & Wesson and Colt each produced their own version for consideration. The S&W Schofield (Break-top) and the Colt 1871 Open Top. The Army excepted and ordered a limited number of the S&W Schofields, however they rejected the Colt '71 Open Top. They wanted a stronger and more powerful cartridge with a top strap. Richards in a panic turned to his old friend and fellow engineer William Mason, and it was they who designed and submitted the 1873 Single Action Army. The Army loved it and ordered thousands of them, soon Colt introduced the 1873 Peacemaker, and the rest as they say is history ...

The above is why you will find examples of many of the guns mentioned above as legal within CFDA rules, even some of the conversions. While no conversions were ever produced in the Old West era larger than .44, a number of companies now produce "faithful reproductions" of them, now chambered in 45 Colt. The 1871 Open Top submitted to the Army was the first cartridge revolver that Colt ever made, they did produce some for civilian use, known at the '72 Open Top, but soon dropped them in favor of the 1873 Peacemaker. They are kind of a "missing link" in the history of six-guns.

Part III - History (The Birth of the Romance & Legend of the Old West) Dime Novels- Dime novels had been around since the mid 1850's, they were cheap paperbacks that sold for 5 cents and later a dime, hence the name. Some were factual information, but they mostly became popular

fiction because authors soon learned "Pulp

Fiction" sold better. They became very popular during the Civil War as authors described the action of war and the heroes that fought them.

Then, during the post-war period and into the 1870's authors wrote about the violent brawls, gun and knife fights that occurred in various cow and mining towns. As the lawmen started to clean up the violence, sometimes by lethal means, the stories started making these lawmen famous, as well as their counterparts on the other side of the law, the Outlaws. Then, the authors began to glorify gunfights as if they were duels of the 18th Century carried out by the "Code of Honor", soon the term "Code of the West" was born. The writers competed with each other to create many folk tales, like Gunfights at High Noon, etc. East Coast folks and Europeans seeking stories of adventure and danger just couldn't get enough and wanted more!

Fun Fact- The term Quick Draw, was really created as a spin from an actual period term

"Quick on the Draw", which meant "hot-headed" in the sense that someone would just pull out a gun and shoot someone on the spur of the moment out of anger. The term "Deliberate" was often used as a sign of respect for real gunfighters who would keep a cool head but were very efficient and deliberate in producing a gun and firing an accurate kill shot.

Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show-

Beginning in 1883 Buffalo Bill, who first gained national popularity in a Ned Buntline novel, started his Wild West Show. It became the biggest show on earth for decades, very popular in the Eastern U.S., becoming even more popular in Europe. Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show dominated the events at the 1893 Chicago World's Fair. But, what that really has to do with the history of CFDA is that Annie Oakley became known as the world's first and most recognizable "Exhibition Shooter"!

Hollywood- It's 1903, a decade after the movie camera and projector were invented, short films and clips were being created. The first movie ever made with a script and scenes was "The Great Train Robbery". It was a movie based on a true story that happened just 18 months prior. On July 3rd, 1901, Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid robbed and looted the Great Northern Coast Flyer. Quote from the Evening News – Detroit, MI (July 4th, 1901), "After dividing the estimated take of \$65,000, the Wild Bunch split up forever, they all realized the outlaw way was dying."

Was this the end of the Wild West? Maybe the real Wild West, but certainly not the Romance and Legend of it! Since this first Hollywood movie was what we now call a Western, all they knew is that it really looked good to the audience, and they needed to make more. Hollywood needed ideas for scripts, and for this, they turned to an assortment of Dime Novels.

<u>Part IV – History (Early Exhibition</u> <u>Shooters & Hollywood Gun Coaches)</u>

Annie Oakley- A young girl, age 15, that was a crack shot with a variety of guns. Discovered by Buffalo Bill Cody, he began to star her in his Wild West Show in 1885. She rose to world-wide fame and became the highest paid performer in the show, except for Buffalo Bill himself.

Some shooting sports already existed at that time, but they were male dominated which added to Annie Oakley's mystique. Her name is still Iconic in today's world.

The Fabulous Topperweins- A husband and wife team that began touring in 1904 and captivated many thousands of fans for decades

with their precision target shooting. Adolf and Elizabeth Topperwein also proved that shooting was a sport that couples could enjoy together. Elizabeth Topperwein competed in and won NRA Target Pistol events.

Ed McGivern- During the late 20's and mainly in the 30's Ed McGivern established himself as one of the

McGivern started writing books and filming some of his shows. His 1938 book, "Fast and Fancy Revolver Shooting" became one of the most highly regarded firearms books in history that detailed the instruction of how to shoot fast and accurately. His teaching and instructions became instrumental in developing enforcement training. He also became quite accomplished in developing long-range pistol shooting with his good friend Elmer Keith.

Statement: <u>I hereby</u> recognize, Ed McGivern as the Father of Speed Pistol Shooting...

Rod Redwing- Was many things, like a Western-Style Exhibition Shooter and performed many shows during the 1950's that dazzled thousands of fans. He performed trick-shots



that some people called magic, but left technical experts questioning how these shots could be possible, but without an explanation of how he did them.

But Rod Redwing was far more than an exhibition shooter. He was one of he first Hollywood Gun Coaches. He taught a long list of some of the biggest stars in Hollywood, Alan Ladd, Ronald Reagan, Burt Lancaster, Glenn Ford, Richard Widmark, Anthony Quinn, Charleton Heston, Dean Martin, and Hugh O'Brien just to name a few. He was also a stuntman and stand-in for many of the fast draw and gunspinning scenes you've perhaps seen in countless westerns. He also acted in many parts in a considerable array of major motion pictures. Rod was also an accomplished gunsmith and worked on many of the guns provided by Stembridge, the

company that outfitted most movies of the day with firearms, holsters, and blank cartridges. He was considered an invaluable all-around man, who could fill many needs on any movie set by a number of top Hollywood directors.

Arvo Ojala- Arvo Ojala was most famed for being the gun coach on the long-running western Gunsmoke. He was the guy on the other end of the street in the famous opening

each week that Matt Dillon gunned down. But, he became even more famous as a holster maker. He patented the very first Fast Draw holster, which was a Buscadero Rig with steel lining to keep the holster



shape firm and a little loose, which allowed the cylinder to begin rotation, while initiating a Fast Draw with the thumb first cocking the hammer, as the gun was being drawn. Arvo's holsters were in big demand to many movie stars and movie sets during the mid-1950's.

Hollywood's Leading Men (Blank Poppers) I firmly believe that Fast Draw began with Hollywood. First, as the movie scripts were being written based upon the Romance and Legend of the Old West, this made Hollywood Westerns very popular around the world. Next, as movie stars trained for their roles they were being taught by coaches like Rod Redwing, Arvo Ojala, Dave Sharp, George Ross, Charles Heard and others. It was their job to teach these Hollywood Stars to look good drawing and firing six-guns loaded with blanks. Some of them got very good at it. Some of them also learned fancy gun handling from their coaches and got very good at that too. I watched an amazing fancy gunhandling scene that James Gardner pulled off in the Maverick series that appears that it was done in one-take.

Hugh O'Brien- Hugh O'Brien was cast as the leading man of the weekly series called, The

Life and Times of Wyatt Earp, in 1954. Rod Redwing worked on the show in the first season, after being coached Hugh began to develop a very very fast draw. As a publicity stunt, he challenged any other leading man in Hollywood to first a \$500 bet, then raised it

to \$1,000, with no takers. I believe that it is possible that a "publicity stunt challenge" by Hugh O'Brien could have really spiked an interest in what soon became the Sport of Fast Draw A Personal Note: I had the honor of personally meeting Hugh on several occasions. The first few times, we talked a lot about Fast Draw and I brought up his famous Hollywood challenge. He claimed it was actually \$5,000, but I learned to sometimes doubt what people in show business say.

In 2010, I was performing my Fast Draw show on stage, as part of a benefit show for the Reno Rodeo Foundation. I had mentioned Hugh O'Brien's Challenge during my act as one of the main influences that began the sport of Fast Draw. After the show I was approached by a Vietnam Veteran, who told me a story about Hugh when he was touring with the USO.


This Veteran told me that his unit was stuck on the front during the USO Show and they all had to miss it. The very next day, Hugh showed up on the "front line" in his full Wyatt Earp Costume complete with his double Buscadero Rig, with a Colt Peacemaker on his right side and his Colt Buntline on his left. Hugh risked his life to entertain and meet those men and actually performed the old hand-clap trick with many of them. The Veteran said, that it meant so much to all of the men there that day and that he would never forget it.

About 6 months later, I was performing my show at the Nevada State Fair and Hugh was there with a table set up signing autographed pictures. I sat down and talked to Hugh and shared that story with him. A smile grew wide on his face as he remembered back to that very day. From that day forward I never doubted him again.... That was the last time I saw Hugh O'Brien, he passed away in 2016. But, I'm sure glad I got to know him. By the way, there's an autographed photo of Hugh O'Brien hanging in our Bat Barn. He was really kind of sweet on Dinah and autographed it to her...

<u>Part V. - History</u> (<u>The Sport of Fast Draw is Born</u>) Dee Woolem- Is acknowledged as "The Father of Fast Draw".

The year is 1955 and Dee was a Knott's Berry Farm reenactor/stuntman who had a gig staging the hold-up of the train circling the park. He had spare time between performances, so he started really practicing his draw and developed a new high-ride holster to provide for less movement to make his draw even quicker. Then, with the help of a park technician he developed the first-ever Fast Draw Timer. He convinced Knott's Berry Farm to promote the National Fast Draw Championship, which made national news. There were 12 only competitors, first place prize was a Knott's Berry Farm Chicken Dinner. It was the first timed Fast Draw contest known to be held, The Sport of Fast Draw was born!

I also had the honor of meeting and talking with Dee at the 1995 WFDA National Championship in Tombstone, AZ which was hosted by Wes Flowers together with Pat & Charlene McMahon, they billed it as the



40th Anniversary of Fast Draw.

Dee went on to host 3 more National Championships, winning all 4 that he put on. He became quite a celebrity and toured the country performing exhibitions for Crossman Arms Co., promoting Fast Draw with their CO-2 powered pellet guns. He sold the rights to his Fast Draw Timer to Great Western Firearms, that distributed all of their Fast Draw Equipment through The Stoeger Arms Company.

Due to the interest in the new sport of Fast Draw, a number of Exhibition Shooters were spawned during the 50's. Rod Redwing was still performing, but he had to do it between Hollywood movies he worked on. Dee Woolem, made hundreds of appearances, as did Joe Bodrie. But, a new phenom shooting talent emerged as a teenage kid named by the name of Thell Reed, he won the 1958 Tombstone Walk n Draw Championship, at age 14!

But, Thell Reed was no "Blank Popper"!!!

Not only did I get to compete along side some of CFDA's biggest lady champions and tough competitors, but I ended up coming in 4th place overall! To say I was beyond excited and proud with where I finished is an understatement considering there were 88 women who competed. So 4th place overall is more than I ever hoped for at the World Championships!

My goals for the future in this sport is to work on my accuracy and

speed. I also hope to make it into more Magnificent 7 finals in the future, and to one day win an overall titled championship. I also look forward to traveling to some different places,





After receiving payment we will then ship the firearm to your FFL Dealer, who will then be responsible to have you fill out the appropriate forms and conduct a background check, according to Federal and your State Laws and Regulations. Please allow up to 2 weeks for CFDA to prepare your firearm for shipping. The buyer is responsible to pay all transfer fees, background

checks directly to their FFL Dealer of choice. <u>All Firearm Sales Are Final</u>. In the unlikely event that your FFL Dealer cannot process your transfer paperwork due to a background check that did not pass. The buyer may contact our office and request a return of the firearm and a refund of the sale. The gun must be returned to CFDA only by the FFL Dealer that it was originally sent to, in the original condition. 

THE GUNS

Single-action revolvers, factory chambered for .45 Colt caliber, with non-adjustable rear sights such as: SAA Colt, Colt Bisley, 1858 Remington conversions, 1875 Remington, S&W Schofield and faithful reproductions thereof, plus most Ruger Vaquero models. The external parts of the revolver must match factory stock contours and made of original type material: i.e. hammers must not be bent in any way. No trigger shoes, no mods to the trigger guard or grip frame, etc. Front sights are optional and barrels must be a minimum length of 4-1/2", except in the Shootist Category (7-1/2"). Hammer knurling may be smoothed.

THE HOLSTERS & GUN BELTS

1800's-style Mexican Loop, Slim Jim, and California Pattern holsters or leather rawhide construction. The over the belt-style holster will be worn on the side of the leg only. No cross-draw, shoulder, buscadero, contemporary Hollywood or steel lined holsters are allowed.

AMMUNITION

95% of ammunition used in Cowboy Fast Draw is .45 colt casings that are specially modified to accept 209 shotgun primers and no gun powder. Velocities reach about 650 fps. Only in major competitions Cowboy Fast Draw Cartridges are used, they must be loaded by CFDA approved reloaders.

TARGETS (THREE STANDARD TARGETS)

17-3/16" Round Plate - 47" Center Height (Start Light in Center) 24" Round Plate - 50" Center Height (Start Light in Center) Balloon-Disc - Rarely Used in Championship Finals - See Specs

White lithium grease is applied to target plates, to track all wax bullet hits.

COMPETITION TIMERS

Digital timers must time to the thousandth of a second. Sanctioned contests must use target with impact sensors.

SHOOTING STYLE

Most folks use a thumb-cocking method, but fanning is allowed. Trigger finger must be out of the trigger guard. If used to cock the hammer the off-hand must not be placed in front of the body before the start light comes on.

CONTESTS

Contests are shot elimination style, best 2 out of 3, or 3 out of 5 shots per round. The standard contest is luck of the draw man vs. man elimination.

1800's period clothing is strongly recommended. Western cowboy, including working cowboy clothing is acceptable. Western boots or moccasins are acceptable footwear. Westernstyle blue and black jeans are acceptable. Victorian Steampunk is also allowed.

SAFETY

One of our primary goals is to *educate as many people as possible in the safe and proper use of firearms.* Even though we use wax bullet ammunition, we treat them as they were live ammunition and observe all established range safety rules.
